The Mathematics Star for this week goes to Nikhitha Akella for improving the presentation of her work.




Mathematics Work of the Week by Nivas Odedra for understanding how to partition numbers to multiply 2 digits by 2 digits.

Wednesday

Breakfast at Youth Hostel. Everyone make-up their own packed lunch. Then off to the buses and a short drive to the Palingbeek Centre – owned by Brugge City Council.
